Many Attend Funeral of Mrs. Redway Today

The funeral of Mrs. Lily Burnham Redway, wife of Dr. Jacques W. Redway, was held at 10 o'clock this morning in her late residence at 254 South second Avenue. Since her death Tuesday scores of people visited the Redway residence to extend their sympathy and it was again filled during the services this morning which were conducted by the Rev. W. H. Owen, former rector of Trinity church here. There were many beautiful floral tributes. Rev. George Thacher Lascelle, of Belmont, a nephew of Mrs. Redway conducted the committal services at the grave, interment being private at Woodlawn cemetery.

Mrs. Redway was the wife of the well known writer on various topics and the author of numerous text books. On her father's side she was descended from Chevalier de La Salle and on her mother's side was a member of the Thacher family of Revolutionary war fame.

The death of Mrs. Redway came as a shock to many people in Mount Vernon. Her charities knew no limits, because her heart was boundless with sympathy for those who suffered or were in distress. It was because of this that she was fitted naturally for positions on boards of many charitable and welfare organizations.

For thirty years she was a director of the Martha Wilson home, being a life member of the board. She was likewise on the Mount Vernon hospital board for 20 years and a member of the board of the Y.W.C.A. She was a member of Bronx chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, and for years chairman of its house committee. For 35 years she was a member of the Universalist church.

Mrs. Redway was born in Ogdensburg, N.Y., February 5, 1854. Her maiden name was Lily Burnham Lascelle, her parents being William Brown and Elizabeth (Thacher) Lascelle. When only a child she was brought to New York with the Lascelle family.

In November 1877 she was married to Maximillian Ebert in New York city. With Mr. Ebert and her parents, she came to live in Mount Vernon in the spring of 1882, going to live at 262 South Second avenue. In the summer of the same year, Mr. Ebert died.

After the death of her first husband, Mrs. Ebert moved to 89 East Fourth street. In 18\_3 she married Dr. Jacques W. Redway. for more than 25 years the Redways resided on East Fourth street, moving to 254 South second avenue about seven years ago, it being next door to the old Lascelle residence. In 1907 Mrs. Redway's daughter, Elizabeth, who had married Walden E. Hammond, of Mount Vernon, died, leaving two children, Max Ebert Hammond and Jacques Redway Hammond. These two grandchildren now reside in Rochester.

Besides her husband and these two grandchildren, Mrs. Redway is survived by a sister, Mrs. Adele Koyt, of Chicago, and a brother, William T. Lascelle, of Sparkill, N. Y.
