MRS. WM. R. REMINGTON

The death of Mrs. Remington on Thursday last [16 Jan] adds to the tragedy which has come to one of the best known families in the village. In March last father and son were taken away, and now the wife and mother has followed her loved ones into the unseen.

At the time of the sickness and death of father and son Mrs. Remington was a semi-invalid. The strain of their long illness increased her ailments and she was illy prepared to bear the shock of their death. She was a woman of strong affections and the double bereavement would have sorely stricken even one of stronger health. She was a broken hearted woman, living in the past with her loved ones, having but little interest in life, and because of her enfeebled physical condition, only slightly responding to the natural healings which time brings to those who are in grief. Four months ago she was taken to the sanitarium at Dansville where she could have special treatment, but her improvement was but temporary and on Thursday last she died of apoplexy.

Mrs. Remington was the daughter of the late Ransom Everest, her only sister being Ella, the wife of President [Almond] Gunnison. She was a student at the university in its early days, taught for a while and was married at an early age to Wm. R. Remington, with whom she lived in great domestic happiness for forty-five years. Her age was sixty-three years.

She was a woman of refinement and fine character, domestic in her tastes, "looking well to the ways of the household," capable, efficient, devoted to her family, a kind neighbor, scrupulously regardful of obligations, reverent of all the sanctities of life, a consistent member of the church and helpful in all Christian and neighborhood activities. Her death comes as a release to her from increasing bodily infirmities, and changed her life of brooding memory of loved ones into a realization of her yearnings for a reunion with them.

She leaves a daughter, Mrs. Frank S. Mills, to whom the sympathy of the community goes out in this triple sorrow that has come to her.

The funeral was held this afternoon from the house, her former pastor, Rev. G. M. Gerrish, of North Adams, Mass., officiating. A male quartet furnished the music.

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
