Winthrop, March 22.—Mrs. Loretta A. Palmer Riggs, wife of Philo P. Riggs, whose death occurred at her home on Massena street at about 4 p.m. Tuesday, March 16th, was born in Lincoln, Vt., Aug. 20, 1848, coming when about 5 years of age with her parents to reside on a farm in Hopkinton, N. Their eldest son, Bert, died Feb. 18, 1889; five grandchildren also survive. The funeral was largely attended last Thursday morning from her late home, Rev. T. Saunders of the Universalist church officiating. Burial was in the family plot at Buckton. Personally Mrs. Riggs was a lady of many admirable characteristics. Quiet, modest and unassuming in manner, gentle, kind and winning, she was endeared to a large circle of steadfast friends, as was verified in the large attendance at the funeral, and the display of rare beautiful flowers presented by the Odd Fellows, the church and the grange. In the home she will be missed and mourned as a kind and affectionate wife and a thoughtful, careful tender mother.

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
