DEATH REMOVES MRS. D.S. ROBINSON Rev. George Hunt of Madison, Wis., Brother of Deceased, Officiated at Funeral Held Here Yesterday

Mrs. D.S. Robinson died at the family home in Massachusetts street early Tuesday morning, after an illness of four years. She had been gradually failing for several weeks and her death was not unexpected.

Emily Cornelia Hunt was born in San Francisco, Calif., in 1854, the daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Timothy Dwight Hunt. Her father established the first Protestant church in San Francisco in October, 1848. Three days after his arrival in California from Hawaii, where he went as a missionary, he was formally invited by the prominent citizens of every religious persuasion to remain in the town and act as chaplain for one year. His compensation was fixed at \$2500 and was quickly subscribed at a public meeting. His first church quarters were at the school house on the plaza, where he delivered two sermons every Sunday. In less than a month the congregation crowded the doors and listened at the windows. In 1872 Rev. Mr. Hunt came to Nunda and served as pastor of the Nunda Presbyterian church for three years and in 1878, their daughter Emily married Denton S. Robinson of this village and since that time she has resided here, respected and beloved by all who knew her.

She is survived by her husband, Denton S. Robinson, Esq., two daughters and two sons: Miss Gertrude, preceptress of Nunda High School; Miss Elizabeth, an instructor in the Rochester schools; Prof. Max B. Robinson of Evansville College, Evansville, Indiana, and Denton D. Robinson, Esq., who is associated with his father in the practice of law here. Mrs. Robinson also leaves three sisters: Miss Mary H. Hunt of New York; Mrs. C.K. Knapp of Sodus and Miss Elizabeth Hunt of Boston; three brothers, Rev. George Hunt of Madison, Wisconsin; James R. Hunt of Los Angeles, Calif., and Stephen Hunt of Kansas City, Mo.

Mrs. Robinson was a member of the Nunda Universalist church, of the Woman's Relief Corps and of the Eastern Star. Her chief interest however always centered in her home. She was a splendid woman, a devoted wife and mother and in her social relations displayed a gentleness and cheerfulness which endeared her to all.

The funeral was held at the family home Thursday afternoon, Rev. George Hunt, a brother of the deceased, officiating, assisted by Rev. A.E. Allison of this village. Burial was made in Oakwood Cemetery.

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
