DEATHS.

In this city, of Typhus Fever, on Sunday, 15th inst., Mr. Charles L. Scott, aged 46 years.

It is with feelings of deep affliction we announce the death of Br. Scott. The suddenness of the event and the severity of the loss has overwhelmed us with sorrow. Br. S. was well known in this community, and greatly beloved, and respected as an upright, honest, and benevolent man, and devoted Christian. He has long been associated with our denomination, and always borne an active part in whatever way he could aid its progress. He has labored in the Bleecker-st. [Third Universalist] Sunday School, of which he was for several years superintendent, and a teacher, both before and after filling that position. He was also a Trustee in the Society, and a Deacon in the Church for several years, and at the time of his death. He was always punctual in his attendance to the institutions of religion, and ready to work in every way he could to make himself useful. His death has caused a feeling of depression in many hearts, and his memory will long live in the minds of those who were associated with him.

He has left a wife and family, and relations, but not without the support and consolations of religion, and the memory of his good works and kind counsels, which will afford them much comfort in their affliction. May his death be sanctified of God to them, to the church and society of which he has been a most useful member, and to all who knew him.

His funeral was attended from the Bleecker-st. church, on Tuesday, by a large concourse of afflicted friends. It was a solemn sight to see his body laid before the altar where so lately he had worshipped and served at the communion table. His voice was silent, his countenance pale—but yet he spoke to us in the memories of the past, exhorting us to future duty. Brs. [Revs.] Chapin, Williamson and Balch, took part in the solemn services of the occasion. Many countenances witnessed what their hearts felt on that occasion. The body was taken from the church and conveyed to the Steamer Vanderbilt, whence it was conveyed to Charlestown, Mass., for interment.
