DR. SECCOMB DIES IN AUBURN
Head of Cayuga County Health Association

Private services were conducted for Dr. M. LeRoy Seccomb, 65, Mandana, head of Cayuga Health association and prominent Auburn physician for 38 years, at 12:30 p. m. last Friday at his home. Edwin Coles, Mansfield, Pa., lay reader was in charge. Final rites were at 2 p.m. in Bradley Memorial chapel, Fort Hill cemetery, in charge of Rev. Hal T. Kearns, former pastor of First Universalist church. Burial was in that cemetery.

Dr. Seccomb, who was born Sept. 8, 1880, in Auburn, died Thursday of last week in Auburn City hospital, where he had been a patient several weeks following a heart attack.

He. was graduated from Auburn Academic High school and the College of Medicine, Syracuse university, in 1904. He began his practice of medicine at Wanakena, St. Lawrence county, and also practiced at Ira Hill before coming to Auburn to begin a practice in 1908.

He had made his home for some years at Mandana, overlooking Skaneateles lake, while continuing his office and practice in Auburn.

He was a member of the Medical Society of the County of Cayuga and Western Ontario Urological and American Urological societies. Only recently, he was reelected president of Cayuga Health association for a sixth year.

He was a veteran of World War I in which he served as a captain with the army medical corps. He also was a member of the medical staffs of both Auburn City and Mercy hospitals and of Auburn Rotary club and of St. Paul's Lodge 124, F. and A. M.

Surviving are his wife, Alice Coles Seccomb; two daughters, Mrs. William Carpenter of Albany, and Mrs. Gertrude Monson of Williamsburg, Va.; a son, Maj. M. LeRoy Seccomb Jr., U.S.A.; a brother, Floyd Seccomb of Syracuse, and two grandsons and a granddaughter.
