In the days of her strength she was most active in the Second Church, later [e.g. after its dissolution] transferring her activity to our church with absolute loyalty and devotion. She was a member of the Wooden Class, and a regular church attendant through all the years.

Mrs. Sedgwick leaves a bereaved family of uncommon devotion, her husband William Sedgwick, her son, William H. and three daughters, Mrs. George Miller and Mrs. Charles Kirn of Rochester and Mrs. Claude Culver of Binghamton, and a sister, Mrs. John Emkey of this city and a granddaughter Avis Miller. Rev. Mr. [William Wallace] Rose conducted the services at her home in Charlotte, Thursday, interment being at Mt. Hope.
