Her winning ways and unselfish disposition naturally made many friends, and no one ever heard of any ruffle or dispute she had with any person in the world. Her home was one of peace and happiness and as a consequence the ties between husband and wife were very strong and abiding. In consequence of her conciliatory disposition she was in high favor with her neighbors and all regret her demise.
