CARLL SMITH, for many years in the hay and feed business in this city, died on Wednesday of paralysis at his home, 173 Hooper Street, Williamsburg. He was born in Huntington, L. I., and was seventy-three years old at the time of his death. In early life he was a grocer's clerk. His only son succeeded to his business a few years ago. Besides his son, he leaves three daughters. The funeral service will be conducted to-morrow by the Rev. Dr. J. Coleman Adams of All Souls' Universalist Church.

Carll Smith, a retired hay and feed merchant, and a former resident of this place, died at his home, 173 Hooper street, Brooklyn, on Wednesday, of paralysis, from which he has suffered for two years past. Mr. Smith was born in this town in 1824, and when a boy went to New York and obtained a position as clerk in a grocery store, at Sheriff and Rivington streets, of which he shortly became owner. Some years after this he took up the hay, feed and fertilizer business at Delancey and Broome streets, which he conducted for many years, finally selling out to his son, Carll V., who now conducts the business. Mrs. Smith died about eight years ago and besides the son named, deceased leaves three daughters, all of whom are married. Mr. Smith owned a valuable farm at Long Swamp, where he used to spend considerable time in the summer, but of late years his son-in-law, E. Walton, has made his summer home there. The funeral takes place to-day (Saturday) at 2 p.m., at his late residence, the Rev. John Coleman Adams, of All Souls' Universalist church, officiating.
