DEATH OF MRS. SQUIRES

After a Long Illness the Wife of Rev. L. H. Squires Passes Away

Mrs. Frances F. Squires, wife of Rev. Lyman H. Squires, pastor of the First Universalist Church, died yesterday morning at her home, corner of East avenue and William street. The deceased was born in 1853 near Attica, N.Y., and was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Danley. She was married in 1874 to Mr. Squires, who was at the time pastor of the church at North Bloomfield. For more than a year Mrs. Squires had been in ill health, and while it was known that she could not recover, yet her death at this time was unexpected. She was brought here from Jamestown in September and treated in the Hahnemann Hospital, until it became evident that she could not recover, when she was removed to the family residence on East avenue. Besides her husband and one daughter, Frances Squires, her mother, brother and a sister, Mrs. Shipler, of Clyde, survive her.

The funeral services will be held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the First Universalist Church, and will be conducted by Rev. Asa Saxe, D. D., and Rev. G. W. Powell.

AT REST IN MT. HOPE
Funeral of Mrs. L. H. Squires Held Yesterday

There was a large attendance yesterday at 2 p.m. at the First Universalist Church, when occurred the funeral of Mrs. Frances F., wife of L. H. Squires, pastor of the church. Rev. David M. Kirkpatrick, pastor of the Second Universalist Church, offered prayer and was followed by Rev. Asa Saxe, formerly pastor of the First Church, in scripture readings and an address, which was characterized by words of comfort for the surviving relatives and friends, and of eulogy on the life of the deceased. Rev. G. W. Powell also addressed the assembled friends.

The church choir rendered several selections as follows: "I Would Not Live Away," "There is a Land," and "Sometime We'll Understand." The bearers were Joseph A. Stull, F. M. McFarlin, W. P. Davis, George M. Sweet, J. D. Whipple and L. H. Van Zandt. There was an unusual profusion of flowers, the entire front of the pulpit platform being decked with them. Prominent among the floral pieces was a large anchor, on which was perched a white dove. This was the gift of the Jamestown lodge of Elks, which was represented by Warren Stowell of Jamestown. Several other floral pieces from the societies and classes of the Jamestown church, by whom Mrs. Squires was universally respected and loved, were received.

Many friends from outside the city were present, among whom were C. D. Danely and wife, of Attica; Mrs. Shipler, of Clyde; B. F. Coe, of Buffalo, city editor of the Buffalo News; Warren Stowell, of Jamestown; Mrs. Charlotte Danely, of Attica; Mr. and Mrs. Amasa Martin and Dwight Martin, of North Bloomfield; Mrs. T. H. Holden and daughter, of Honeoye Falls. Interment was made at Mt. Hope.
