Fannie Ann Emmons Stanton

Fannie A. Emmons, wife of Mark Stanton, of Spafford, N.Y., died at the residence of her brother, Elmer E. Stanton, 428 South West-st., Syracuse, N.Y., after a long and painful illness, Saturday, January 10, 1914, in her 51st year. She was born and always lived in the town of Spafford, N.Y., the only child of William A. Emmons and Ann M. Patteo. She was married to Mark Stanton, October 19, 1881. They immediately moved to their farm and have lived there ever since. Mrs. Stanton was beloved by all who knew her. She had a kindly disposition and a good word for every one, and when help was needed in any home of sickness, Fannie was one of the most welcome persons that could be found and she always went. She is survived, besides her husband, by William C. Emmons, a half-brother, of Spafford, N.Y.; Mrs. Salem T. Foster of Gloversville, N.Y., a half-sister, and her step-mother, Mrs. William A. Emmons of Spafford, N.Y. The funeral was held from the residence of Elmer E. Stanton, Syracuse, N.Y., on the 14th day of January, 1914, at 1 p.m., the remains being placed in the receiving vault at Oakwood cemetery in that city. The services were conducted by Rev. F. [Frederick] W. Betts of the First Universalist Church of Syracuse, N.Y. He took for his text the first to fourth verses of the fourth chapter of St. John's gospel. His discourse was one of hope and comfort and great faith. The funeral was attended by many relatives and sympathizing friends.
