Mrs. R. M. Stocking Dies at Canton
Was Widow of Former U. S. Vice Counsel at Quebec
(Special to the *Times*)

Canton, Nov. 19—Mrs. Imogene Storrs Stocking, widow of Robert M. Stocking, former United States Vice Consul at Quebec, died Monday evening [18 Dec 1919] at 10:30 at her home in Court street, this village, aged 73 years. The funeral arrangements have not as yet been completed.

Mrs. Stocking was a daughter of the late Levi B. Storrs¹, for many years a well known merchant and tailor of this village, and was educated here in Canton, where she spent her girlhood. She was married to Robert M. Stocking, a member of an old and prominent family of the Flackville neighborhood, who was for several years during the sixties teller of the old Canton bank which failed in [1869?]. Mr. Stocking then took a clerical position under a contractor who was building the old Clifton railroad, long since abandoned, and following the completion of that work, went with his employer to a contract near Quebec. He located at Quebec, where for many years he conducted a general railway and steamer ticket agency, acting as vice consul for the United States government in that city. Upon his death about 16 years ago he was succeeded in both his business and consular positions by his son, Frank Stocking, and Mrs. Stocking came here to her home, where she has since resided.

The surviving relatives are a sister, Miss Carrie Storrs of this village and a brother, Frank Storrs of Watertown.
