WILLIAM W. STOLL BURIED

William W. Stoll, a well-known inventor and wheelwright, was buried from his residence, 230 Hewes Street, Brooklyn, yesterday. The interment was made in the family plot in Greenwood.

Mr. Stoll was born in Nassau, Germany, in 1825. He went to London when a young man, and constructed a grain elevator of his invention for Sir Walter Power. He arrived in this city in 1847, and erected the elevator at the foot of Rutgers Street for George V. Hecker, the famous miller, which was the cause of the great grain strike at that time. Two sons and two daughters survive him. Mr. Stoll had been troubled for a long time with heat disease, which caused his death on Monday last. He was a member of All Souls' Universalist Church, on South Ninth Street, Williamsburg.
