

[Stuart, Carlos]

Carlos D. Stuart, born in Berlin, Vermont, July 28, 1820, died in Huntingdon, L. I., Jan. 22, 1862, in the forty-third year of his age. Though not rising into distinction and applause, he was a poet of more than ordinary merit, and of fine literary taste generally. He was also a journalist of repute, being for several years an associate editor of the *N.Y. Sun*. Not, however, on this account do I record his name in these pages, nor simply as a genial brother in the gospel, but as one whose talents were openly consecrated to the cause of Universalism. He was of us in the sentiment, and with us in personal presence and influence—an encomium not deserved by many public men who have had the blessing of its baptism. His pure life illustrated his faith, and his death was a seal of its power.
