George Stubbs died at his home in this village last Sunday afternoon, after a lingering illness for several months. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Mr. [Charles] Legal at the Universalist church on Wednesday afternoon. The interment was at Boughton Hill cemetery. The deceased was born in Springfield, Ill., in 1840. When quite young his parents moved to this State, where he has resided most of the time since. He was employed as clerk in Bradley's store at East Bloomfield, and for a time at Syracuse with the same parties. He was employed in the store of Wm. Gallup & Co. a number of years, and made many friends. Leaving this position, he formed a partnership with O. L. Lobdell and went into the hardware business in the old Brace building. This business was not successful, and after a few years the firm was dissolved. Since that time Mr. Stubbs has been in poor health and has not been actively engaged in business. The deceased has been a member of Milnor Lodge, F. and A. M., for the past twenty years. In politics he was a Democrat, but never took a prominent part in politics. He was a regular attendant at the Universalist church. In May, 1879, he married Miss Ella Armstrong, who, with two children, survive him; these, with his sister, Mrs. J. D. Bement of Charlotte, Mich., have the sympathy of a large circle of friends. Mr. Stubbs will long be remembered in this community as a man of sterling honesty and untiring industry, a kind husband and father, and a model citizen.
