MRS. LYDIA G. TINGUE Nonagenarian Passes Away Following Extended Illness

Mrs. Lydia Garlock Tingue died at 8 Clark street last evening in her 97th year, following an illness of five years. She had been a resident of St. Luke's Home for eight years preceding her illness.

Mrs. Tingue was the only woman holding the distinction of coming through the Civil War lines by a flag of truce after her husband died in the South.

Lydia Garlock was born March (5?), 1825 in Canajoharie and spent her girlhood there and in Fort Plain, where she was married to Freeman Wyman of Oswego. In 1875, some years after the death of her husband, she was again married, to Simeon Tingue, wealthy Fort Plain dry goods merchant, who died several years ago. She was a member of the Universalist Church of Fort Plain.

She leaves one daughter, Mrs. Wheeler O. Branaman of Albany, and one grandson, Leon W. Hickey of Chicago.
