Dr. George M. Tuttle

Dr. George Montgomery Tuttle, one of the best known gynecologists in this country, died at his home, 38 West Fifty-second street, early yesterday morning, from angina pectoris. Dr. Tuttle was born in Rochester, N.Y., on October 2, 1856, the son of the Rev. Dr. James H. Tuttle [Universalist] and Harriet (Merriam) [Merriman] Tuttle. He was educated at Dresden, Germany and at Phillips Academy, Andover. He was graduated from Yale in 1877, and took his degree from the College of Physicians and Surgeons in 1880. From 1884 until the time of his death Dr. Tuttle was Attending Gynecologist at the Roosevelt Hospital, and part of that time served as president of the Medical Board of the hospital. He belonged to the leading medical societies of the country and to the principal clubs of New York, and was a valued contributor to medical journals. He leaves a widow who was Mrs. Thomas Story Kirkbride, and a daughter, Miss Natalie Chauvenet Tuttle.

DR. GEORGE M. TUTTLE

Dr. George Montgomery Tuttle, one of the best known gynecologists in the United States, died suddenly early yesterday morning at his home, No. 38 West 52d street. At the time of his death Dr. Tuttle was visiting gynecologist at Roosevelt Hospital, where for several years he was president of the medical board.

Dr. Tuttle was born in Rochester, October 2, 1856. He was the son of the Rev. Dr. James H. Tuttle [Universalist] and Harriet Merriman Tuttle. He received his early education at Andover, and in 1877 he was graduated from Yale. He also studied abroad [in Dresden, Germany]. In 1880 he took his medical degree from the College of Physicians and Surgeons.

From 1880 to 1881 Dr. Tuttle was an interne in the New York Hospital, and afterward physician in chief of the New York City Immigrant Hospital. From 1888 to 1898 he was professor of gynecology at the College of Physicians and Surgeons.

Dr. Tuttle was a member of the New York Academy of Medicine, New York Medical Society, New York Medical and Surgical Society, Society of the Alumni of the New York Hospital, and Society of American Wars. He was also a member of the University, Century, Yale and New York yacht clubs.

The noted specialist was a frequent contributor to "The American Text Book of Gynecology," "The New York Medical Record," and "The New York Medical Journal." He was married in Italy on April 5, 1906, to Mrs. Thomas Story Kirkbride. He leaves a widow and a daughter, Natalie.
