JAMES TYLER FUNERAL WILL BE TOMORROW
Service to Take Place at Parkdale Terrace Residence

Funeral services for James Redman Tyler, Rochester architect who was found dead at his home, 147 Parkdale Terrace, yesterday morning, will be conducted tomorrow afternoon at 3:30 o'clock from the residence.

The Rev. Charles Clare Blauvelt, minister of the First Universalist Church, will officiate. Monroe Commandery will conduct the Masonic ritual.

Mr. Tyler, who had suffered ill health since his retirement from business in January, [1932?], shot himself in a garage in the rear of his home. He was 67 years of age.

Mr. Tyler was born in Rochester Mar. [9?], 1866, the son of James Redman and Margaret Montgomery Tyler. He was educated in Rochester public schools and the old Free Academy. He obtained his training as an architect in an office in Elmira and was for a time in the office of J. Warner Foster in Rochester.

Mr. Tyler was a member of the American Institute of Architects, the Rochester Society of Architects, the [?] Corinthian Temple, [?] Chapter, Doric Council, Monroe Commandery, Rochester Consistory, Damascus Temple, Lalia [R__?] Grotto, Royal Order of Jesters, Sons of the American Revolution, and Rochester Lodge of Elks, and was an honorary member of the Damascus Temple Patrol.

He is survived by his widow, Minnie L. Goodger; a daughter, Mrs. George C. [Evelyn] Lennox; and two granddaughters, Marion Jean and Nancy Tyler Lennox.
