JAMES H. UHLE, FORMER BATH MAN, DEAD, NEARLY 86 Died At Little Falls On November 26

James H. Uhle, aged nearly 86, died last Thursday night at his home in Little Falls, following an illness of two weeks from a general breakdown. For many years Mr. Uhle was a resident of Bath, living on Rumsey street. He was a man of fine personality, a gentleman of the old school type, and had a host of friends in Bath who have learned of his death with sorrow. For several years past he had made his home at Little Falls, and The Evening Times of that city carried the following story of his death.

"Friends were surprised to learn of the death of James H. Uhle, which occurred at his home, 260 West Main street at 8:30 last night. Tho he had been ill over two weeks of a general breakdown it was not known that his condition was serious. Mr. Uhle was descended from one of the oldest and most influential families of the town of Little Falls. He was born on the 30th of December, 1850, his parents being James H. and Maria Phillips Uhle. He remained on the farm until he became a young man, when he moved to this city and learned the carpenter's trade, which he followed for 40 years. The family home was on Church street. Some years ago he removed to Bath to reside with a relative, but returned to Little Falls a few years ago. He was a man of cheerful disposition, which probably explains why he was so well preserved for a man of his advanced years. He was a man of integrity, an intelligent workman and a good citizen. He was an attendant at St. Paul's Universalist church. Mr. Uhle was twice married, his first wife being Addie Following her decease, he married Emma Smith of the town of Danube. She died a few years ago. There survive a son, Ellis Jerome Uhle, of Ridgewood, N.J., a granddaughter, Jane R. Uhle of Ridgewood, and one sister, Miss Mary Uhle, of this city.

"The funeral will be held at 2 p.m. Sunday from the home, Rev. Mr. [Truman] Menadue of the Universalist church officiating. Interment in the Church Street Cemetery."
