## Little Falls Man Drops Dead at Parade in Utica

Utica, June 4.—John T. Walrath, 77, of 38 Church street, Little Falls, dropped dead on the steps of the [Universalist] Church of the Reconciliation while watching the Elks' parade here yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Walrath, born in the town of Danube, Sept. 25, 1853, had been a resident of Little Falls nearly his entire life. He was employed by the Cherry-Burrell Corporation for 48 years as a foreman in the carpenter shop.

He leaves two daughters, Mrs. Leland C. [Madge] Wires and Mrs. L. Stephen Timmerman and a son, Staring, this city; two sisters, Mrs. F. C. Cummings of Rochester, and Mrs. A. T. Bradley of New York, and a brother, Eugene M. Walrath of Little Falls.

Mr. Walrath was stricken five minutes after his son, Staring, a drummer of the Little Falls Military Band, passed in review.

Former members of the local band from a number of places in Central New York, as well as bandmen from many nearby municipalities attended, for Mr. Walrath had gained a wide acquaintance during the many years he played with the local organization. The employees [employees] of the Cherry-Burrell factory, where Mr. Walrath was so long employed, attended in a body. The bearers were Frank Timmerman, Edward Munk, W. T. Wolfenden, Myers Bucklin, George J. Schiemer and C. B. Dalzell.
