One of the most loyal members and hardest workers in the Church of Good Tidings, Brooklyn, has been Mrs. Adrienne J. Webb. Somewhat over a year ago, a serious illness almost ended her career. Her many friends were happy to see her rally and return to active life even with restrictions. The recovery, however, was only temporary and she passed on to the Other Side on May 17, in her sixty-fifth year. The memorial service was held in the Church of Good Tidings on May 19, with the Rev. Carl H. Voss, minister, and the Rev. Emerson H. Lalone, Canton, a former minister of the church, officiating. She is survived by her mother, Mrs. Mary N. Blackmore.

The Church of Good Tidings was a mission movement sponsored by All Souls Church during the pastorate of the late Dr. Almon Gunnison. From its beginning, Mrs. Webb was actively interested in its work and was untiring in her efforts for its advance, giving generously of energy and money. The Rev. Emerson J. Lalone, during his pastorate of six years, resided in her home which became the meeting-place for many church gatherings. Her interest was also in the Chapin Home for the Aged [a Universalist institution], the work of the Protestant Big Sisters for the blind and in the Metropolitan Universalist Women's Alliance, of which she was vice-president at the time of her death.
