DEATH OF GEORGE W. WEED

In the death of George W. Weed the Eastern District has lost a well known and highly respected resident, and his demise is generally regretted. His death makes a vacancy in the board of deacons of All Souls' Universalist Church, South Ninth street, near Bedford avenue.

Mr. Weed was also the clerk of the church and filled that and the position of deacon for a number of years, and his loss will be greatly felt. Mr. Weed's death occurred yesterday, and was due to pneumonia, following an attack of the grip, from which he had suffered for about two weeks. He was 78 years old, but in spite of his advanced age, was very active in church and other matters. He occupied the dwelling at 214 Hewes street, where he had lived for the past twenty-five years. He was born in New York, but took up his residence in the Eastern District, and has occupied the same house for that period of years. He leaves a wife and two married sons.

Two weeks ago he was stricken with the grip, and despite the efforts of his physician, pneumonia developed and his death followed.

Funeral services will be conducted at his late home at 8 o'clock on Monday night, by the Rev. John Coleman Adams, pastor of All Souls' Universalist Church. The interment will be on Tuesday morning at Cypress Hills Cemetery, and will be private and at the convenience of the family. The Masonic ritual will also be conducted on the same evening by the Polar Star Lodge No. 245, F. and A.M., of which Mr. Weed had been a member for about fifty years. He was one of the oldest Masons in this city and was a member of the National Lodge of Independent Order of Odd Fellows for about the same period. It is expected that there will be a large attendance of representatives of both orders at the funeral service.

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
