EDWIN F. WHITE DIED LAST NIGHT

At His Home on Blandina Street—Had been in Failing Health for Some Time

Edwin F. White died at his home, 168 Blandina street, shortly before 8 o'clock last evening. His health had been failing for some time, but his condition was not considered of a very serious nature until ten days ago and since that time had had sank [sic] rapidly. His ailment was a complication of diseases.

Edwin F. White was a native of this city, having been born here December 27, 1849. He was the son of Maria and the late David P. White. His father was a School Commissioner and after graduating he entered his father's printing office to learn the trade. The establishment was located on Broad street and was conducted under the firm name of White & Floyd. Mr. White worked in that shop and many others for many years. Outside of the period from 1884 to 1894, Mr. White had always made his home in this city. In the ten years excepted he lived in New York City, where he worked in the office of the Recorder. When a young man he was active in many organizations and took a forward interest in the firemen's organization. Politically he was a Democrat, but he had never striven for office. He attended the Universalist church.

Mr. White was married to Mary E. Thomas [on] November 25, 1876 in this city by the Rev. Charles H. Lee. She survives with one son, David F. He is also survived by his mother; two brothers, C. D. and Wallace W. White, both of Chicago; two sisters, Mrs. V. J. Nye and Mrs. E. D. Bridenbecker of this city.
