## DEATHS.

The deceased was a woman of rare endowments. Purity of heart, gentleness of spirit, a tender and loving disposition, and a charity and philanthropy broad as the world, were her leading traits of character. To these were added a cultivated mind and a great general intelligence, which made her an object of the deepest esteem to those who enjoyed the happiness of her acquaintance, and caused her society to be sought and prized by all who valued these high qualities. Her last days were full of peace. The religion of Jesus the Saviour of the world, which she had long honored and enjoyed, shed its brightest light and sweetest hopes to her soul, as the sands of life ran out... Having calmly made preparations for her departure, and expressed her wishes in regard to her funeral and burial, and given her benediction to the loved ones around her dying bed, she calmly sank into the arms of Jesus... Her funeral was attended in Auburn, on the 3d inst., and her remains were then conveyed to Kelloggsville for burial. May heaven's richest consolations comfort all who mourn her departure.
