THE DEATH RECORD.
Noah S. Wilson

Noah Steer Wilson died at 7:30 A.M. to-day in his 74th year. Mr. Wilson had for several years suffered considerably with asthma. About two weeks ago he became indisposed from an attack of grip, but was not confined to his bed. In fact he was able to be about the house, and on Thursday, Friday and Saturday did considerable out-door work. He was no worse on Sunday, but during the night was attacked with a sinking spell from which he could not rally. The deceased was born in Floyd Jan. 8, 1921, but had lived in the town of Rome practically all his life. When two years old he became a member of the family of his uncle, Noah Steer, of this town. For many years he occupied a farm on the road leading from the Turin road to Delta. Last spring he sold the buildings and a part of the land of that farm and removed to a house near the Tremain school house, so-called, on the Turin road. Mr. Wilson was a modest, unassuming man of rare integrity and sterling honesty. All who knew him honored and respected him. One who had the pleasure of his acquaintance for many years said he had never known the deceased to speak ill of any one. If he could not speak well of a person he held his peace. He was a member of the Universalist Church. Mr. Wilson was twice married. [On] Jan. 7, 1846, he married Jane A. Bronson of Lee. She died Feb. 1, 1851. [On] Sept. 3, 1863, he married Julia Putnam Gillette of Steuben, who survives. Besides his wife he leaves three sons, John W., George E., and Lester, all of Rome, [and] one stepson, Dr. A. A. Gillette of Rome. Also one brother, Delos of Rome, and three sisters, Mrs. Martha Rowbotham of Sault De St. Marie, Mich., Mrs. Sarah J. Myers of Constantia, N.Y., and Mrs. Mary Dedis of Evergreen, Colo.
