MRS. LOUISE WRIGHT, 84, LONG ILL, DIES

Mrs. Louise B. Wright, 84, formerly of 314 Sherman St., widow of Edward T. Wright, died at 5:50 this morning in the House of the Good Samaritan, where she had been a patient since Dec. 20.

Mrs. Wright, a patient at the Brown Nursing Home, Adams Center, from the spring of 1968 until she entered the hospital a week ago, had been an invalid since she suffered a stroke Feb. 17, 1961. She was admitted to the hospital after another stroke.

Surviving her are two sons, George R. Wright, whose address is not known, and Edward F. Wright, Star Lake; two grandchildren; two great-grandchildren; and a sister, Miss Helen E. Bacon, 316 Sherman St.

Mrs. Wright was born Jan. 23, 1885, at Antwerp, a daughter of George and Rachel Streeter Bacon. She was married to Edward T. Wright, also of Antwerp, on Nov. 11, 1909, at Richfield Springs.

Mr. and Mrs. Wright lived at various places where Mr. Wright was a telegrapher for the New York Central Railroad. From 1912 to 1915, after he left railroad service, Mr. Wright [and] his brother Charles D., owned and operated the former White Grocery here.

In 1915 Mr. and Mrs. Wright moved to Dexter, where he was an employe[e] of the railroad freight house. They returned to this city to live in 1934 and Mr. Wright was employed at the local freight house until he died May 16, 1943, at the age of 66.

She was a member and past noble grand of the Dexter Rebekah Lodge and a member of Jefferson Chapter, Order of Eastern Star, and of the All Souls Universalist Church.

The funeral will be Monday afternoon at 2 at the Cleveland-McCallen Funeral Home. Rev. Weston Stevens, pastor of the All Souls Universalist Church, will officiate. Burial will be at Antwerp.
